Committee Recommendation and Adoption of Report:  
Amended and re-referred to the Committee on Public Safety and Civil Justice without further recommendation

1.1 A bill for an act  
1.2 relating to transportation; requiring that cellular phones used in motor vehicles  
1.3 be hands-free; providing a defense; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota  
1.4 Statutes, chapter 169.

1.5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.6 Section 1. **[169.472] USE OF CELLULAR PHONES.**

1.7 **Subdivision 1. Definitions.** For purposes of this section:

1.8 **(1) "Hands-free device" means an attachment, add-on, or addition to a cellular**  
1.9 **phone, whether or not permanently installed in a motor vehicle, that when used allows the**  
1.10 **vehicle operator to maintain both hands on the steering wheel; and**

1.11 **(2) "Use" means talking, text messaging, or listening on a cellular phone.**

1.12 **Subd. 2. Prohibition.** No person may use a cellular phone while operating a motor  
1.13 **vehicle that is in motion unless the cellular phone is equipped and used with a hands-free**  
1.14 **device. A peace officer may not issue a citation for a violation of this subdivision unless**  
1.15 **the officer lawfully stopped or detained the driver of the motor vehicle for another moving**  
1.16 **violation other than a violation involving motor vehicle equipment.**

1.17 **Subd. 3. Defense.** It is an affirmative defense against a charge of violating  
1.18 **subdivision 2 for a person to produce evidence that the cellular phone was used for the**  
1.19 **purpose of contacting the following in response to an emergency:**

1.20 **(1) a public safety answering point, by dialing 911 or other emergency telephone**  
1.21 **number;**

1.22 **(2) a hospital, clinic, or doctor's office;**

1.23 **(3) an ambulance service provider;**

1.24 **(4) a fire department or law enforcement agency; or**

2.1 (5) a first aid squad.
